THE BETRAYER AND THE BETRAYED

An Astrological Contrast between Jawara and Jammeh

Though born four decades apart, both **Sir Dawda Kairaba Jawara** (16 May 1924) and **Yahya Jammeh** (25 May 1965) share the sign of **Taurus**, suggesting a karmic link rooted in persistence, determination, and a desire to shape their environments with lasting impact. Yet, beneath this shared solar influence, their charts diverge dramatically one infused with Pluto's transformative depth, the other driven by Mars's aggressive assertiveness. This polarity illuminates how the *betrayed and the betrayer* mirrored each other in destiny.

Jawara: Pluto and Venus in the First House

Jawara's Cancer Ascendant with Pluto-Venus in the first house gave him a magnetic, transformative aura. He was the archetypal statesman who rose through patience, diplomacy, and resilience. Pluto made him capable of constant renewal, surviving political challenges and even the trauma of exile. Venus added grace and charm, allowing him to govern with persuasion rather than intimidation. But Pluto-Venus carried an archetypal shadow: the fear of betrayal by those he trusted. This was his karmic vulnerability, mirrored in the ultimate act of betrayal when his young bodyguard seized power from him in 1994.

Jammeh: Mars and the Martial Drive

Jammeh, born May 25, 1965, carries the **late Taurus Sun**, close to Gemini's edge, giving him a restless, assertive energy unlike Jawara's steady Taurean calm. His chart is heavily influenced by **Mars**, the planet of aggression, conquest, and force. Mars signatures are common in leaders who rise through **military means**, and Jammeh did exactly that with the July 22, 1994 coup. Where Jawara embodied **Venusian diplomacy** (peace, persuasion, charm), Jammeh embodied **Martian willpower** (force, domination, confrontation). Their destinies were astrologically opposed: the peacemaker and the soldier.

Shared Taurus Sun: Earthly Builders, Different Tools

Both men, as Taureans, were builders who left indelible marks on The Gambia. Taurus energy seeks stability, material progress, and rootedness in land and tradition. Jawara expressed this through **gradual reform, education, and development projects**, while Jammeh pursued it through **grand displays of infrastructure and centralized power**.

Yet the difference lies in their planetary tools:

Jawara used Pluto-Venus: transformation through charm, resilience, and diplomacy.

• Jammeh used Mars: conquest through assertion, military force, and personal will.

The Archetypal Drama: The Father and the Son, the Healer and the Warrior

Astrologically, their relationship reflects an archetypal drama: the **older Taurean statesman (Jawara)** embodying Plutonian endurance, and the **younger Taurean warrior (Jammeh)** embodying Martian rebellion.
